After a COVID respite, this 4th year was one of the best and the vendors found new people to help. Information gathered in a senior needs survey disclosed the top concerns for seniors is in-home care, home safety, inflation, transportation and food. A large percentage wanted special help and these requests go to the appropriate agency. Depending on donations, future programs will provide incentives for in-home care. One hundred percent of your donations go directly to Lake County seniors. Thank you Lake County donors.

Lake Links New Volunteer Program Coming

Lake Links, the non-profit senior transportation provider in Lake County is getting ready to launch a new volunteer driver program, "Ride Links". Ride Links volunteers will be driving their own vehicles to provide rides to non-driving seniors. Volunteers will be screened for their driving records and a background check and then

trained to safely transport seniors. Lake Links will schedule rides based on each driver's availability.

Lake Links is working on final details of the Rides Links program and beginning to recruit volunteer drivers. For more information or to volunteer, contact Lake Links at 707-995-3330, email:

In addition to Ride Links, Lake Links currently provides 2 other transportation programs for seniors in Lake County. Eligible Pay-Your-Pal riders find their own drivers and Lake Links reimburses their mileage. Medi-Links, in partnership with Lake Transit, provides low-cost rides to out-of-county medical appointments.—Paul Branson, Lake Links Board of Directors

Advanced Care Directives

The Greatest Gift that You Can Give Your Loved Ones...Start the Advance Care Planning Conversation Today!



Every day we make dozens of choices for ourselves — some of them are small and of Lake County others have more far-reaching significance. Our loved ones often know our favorite books, movies, foods and vacation spots. Yet, when it comes to some of the most important decisions we may need to make — choices about what we would want for our health care if we could not speak for ourselves — few of our friends and family can be sure of what our wishes are. Like you, my family members are precious to me; and I want them to be spared the burden of guessing my wishes for care at the end of life if I should become incapacitated.

As a health care professional, I have seen the pain and grief first-hand when a loved one has not formally discussed or documented his/her preferred options for health care or end-of-life care. This results in a range of circumstances, from family members battling over decisions or overwhelmed with guilt and feelings of helplessness because of being tasked with the responsibility of guessing what health care options their family members might want.

Advance Care planning may ensure that you live in a way that is meaningful for as long as you live, and it is one of the greatest gifts you can give your family.

Planning for our death is something often neglected. With all of our advancements in medicine, we still tend to avoid talking about dying, which is a natural part of life, let alone planning for this significant event. Not sure how to begin? Hospice Services of Lake County (HSLC) and your primary care provider have the tools to help you start "the conversation" about health care options. It's an educational process that will lead you toward what feels more comfortable in making these personal decisions. The HSLC planning tool offers a list of questions to guide you before completing the Advance Care Directive, which is the next step.

In 2023 we will host a memorial event for Gene Paleno and dedicate a park bench in his honor. A beloved inaugural member of the Silver Foundation, Gene Paleno was well known for his many acts of kindness to others. His contributions to the community are voluminous and legendary. Gene was president of the West Region Town Hall, a prolific author and tireless advocate for seniors and pets. He was a regular contributor to the Lake County Record-Bee, the Lake County Bloom and Lake County Community Radio.

Gene was all "Lake County," finding time to give back to the community he loved in ways only he could. His book, "Lake County History: A Mystical Adventure in Time" has become a reference tool about the County's history and formation. It graces tabletops, shelves and libraries throughout the County.

Fiction and non-fiction, Gene wrote many books. Among his last was The Porter Conspiracy, a true story about Civil War's Fitz John Porter and his long battle to regain his rightful status as a General, "righting a terrible wrong" as Gene put it.

Gene's family gifted to the Lake County Silver Foundation a treasure trove of his books including the Porter Conspiracy in the hopes that book sales would help fund the continuing work of the foundation.
